RE: Communication about Academic Integrity

Issues of student academic misconduct have been of concern at UMBC and nationally for some time. I believe we must explicitly and repeatedly address this issue so we retain our solid reputation of integrity among employers, graduate and professional schools, and the Maryland public. UMBC is viewed as an institution that values excellence and produces graduates prepared for success. Our efforts gain meaning if our students understand the value of academic integrity, respect the work of others, and adopt an ethical framework that guides their behavior.

The UMBC Faculty Senate adopted the attached statement on academic integrity in 2001. I am writing to remind you to call this to the attention of your full-time and part-time faculty. I strongly encourage you to urge your faculty to discuss the subject with their students as the new semester begins. Student responses to the campus wide Academic Integrity surveys indicate that students were most likely to learn about policies and expectations related to appropriate academic conduct from faculty. Thus we have both an opportunity and a responsibility to help our students understand the complicated issue related to academic integrity. Included in this packet is a letter written by Bill Taylor to his students when he was a professor of Political Science at Oakton Community College in Illinois. The letter discusses roles and responsibilities of both students and faculty related to academic integrity. This letter was written many years ago and has been shared by Dr. Taylor online. He has given his permission for its use on other campuses. The letter may be distributed to faculty and can serve as a guideline for discussion. It is available online at:

The standards must be well known and easily accessible. Enforcement must be fair and consistent. In this way, we will provide moral direction by creating an environment intolerant of dishonesty and a culture oriented to learning and the development of integrity as a UMBC value.
